Edwin Sung

Edwin Sung was born in Hong Kong and came to the UK in 2009 to study. After graduating from the University of Cambridge in Mathematics, he became a software developer. Edwin is a violinist, pianist and trombonist, and began learning these instruments at the ages of 5, 6 and 12, respectively. He is also a freelance music composer who has been writing music since he was 12, but without any formal training. He learnt most of his composing techniques through joining orchestras that performed different repertoires, ranging from baroque music to light music. As well as the Cambridge Concert Orchestra, Edwin is currently a member of the City of Cambridge Symphony Orchestra, the Cambridge Sinfonietta and the Cambridge Graduate Orchestra. Edwin was particularly motivated to continue his composing after a trip to Ireland in March 2013, when a local orchestra invited him over and performed one of his many works, which was to be premiered in their annual music festival. The Beauty of Life is an orchestral piece written by Edwin just before his graduation in 2014 to encourage graduates to face life in a positive way. Tonight is its premiere.

VSO was set up in 1958 to offer fresh opportunities to young people prepared to go overseas to help in post-independence countries while at the same time learning valuable life lessons themselves to take into their future careers.

Since then, VSO has grown into an international organisation that currently works with 662 partners in 25 developing countries worldwide. VSO now focuses on sending professional volunteers to provide support and share valuable skills in areas of health, education, governance and a huge variety of other fields. From paediatricians to teacher trainers, horticulturists to plumbers, our wide range of volunteers are sharing skills and changing lives.

VSO still provides volunteering opportunities to young people through the International Citizen Service for 18-25 year olds, but now the focus is on all age groups who want to contribute, including retirees who still have the enthusiasm to help! For the volunteer themselves, the benefit remains the same - the opportunity to learn as much from challenges as success, to understand differences in interpretation of information, to take advantage of situations in ways never planned or contemplated and in short - to learn.

Last year VSO volunteers trained over 136,000 people and improved the lives of approximately 2 million people in developing countries worldwide, helping people to lift themselves out of poverty, but for those who give of their expertise, the experience they gain themselves is often just as valuable.
